Southwold NHS dental surgery

Thousands of people living in the Southwold area can now make appointments at a new NHS dental surgery that opened on 6 August.

Three dentists will be working there offering NHS healthcare for more than 4,500 people. Health bosses at NHS Gt. Yarmouth and Waveney felt it was essential for families in the Southwold area to open up a dental practice in the town as there is currently no NHS service for adults.

Elaine Bond, Head of Contracting at NHS GYW, said: "This new practice is going to give a valuable service for families in the area and will provide

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additional access for patients the Reydon and Southwold areas."

Southwold Dental Surgery is based at **43 The High Street**, Southwold, and new patients wishing to book an appointment should call **01502 723379**.

Dr Sue Allen, one of the dentists and new partners of the business with Dr Cheryl Frost, said: "We will be opening five days a week with a late night on a Wednesday, and Saturday mornings from 9am to 12noon.

"We have refurbished all the existing facilities and are hoping in the future to offer reminder services such as text messages or a phone facility."

SOUTHWOLD TOWN COUNCIL Highlights from Meeting of the Town Council of Southwold, held on Tuesday 30th June 2009.

Police Report: Sgt Nigel Thompson introduced to replace Sgt Cudmore. 10 crimes since last meeting: 2 incidents of cashpoint machine skimming devices, vandalism at St Edmunds Church and Indian Restaurant, and a dwelling burglary. Arrests made re. skimming. Large beach party organised via a social networking site by pupils from a local school left great deal of rubbish for WDC to clean up. Police poster to be displayed in school's VI Form Common Room expressing disappointment at mess.

Planning:

(i) Change of use from A1 (Retail) to A3 (Restaurant and Delicatessen), construction of a single storey rear extension, installation of 2no. dormer windows, 1no. new window and new chimney, 1 Church Street, for Mr N Foskett. Approve on condition filter installed. (ii) Listed Building Consent to above. As above.

Town Council received WDC decisions on previous applications at 9 Church Street and 33 Pier Avenue.

Planning application by Walberswick Parish Council for work in the Blyth Estuary affecting Delacroix, Tinker's and Robinson's marshes, Hen Reedbeds and Reydon, Woodsend & Southwold Town Marshes.

WDC's S106 Schedule. £1052.55 of S106 money and £878.00 S111 money still awaited spending. To ask S106 officer to make money available for Klondyke.

Recreational Dev. Council's letter (22.6.09) - permission from Town Council and The Common trustees to amend planning consent for William Godell Pavilion and have a paved area in front of pavilion. No objection - noise to be controlled and doors kept shut when music played.

Committee Reports: 16 June Report of Policy & Finance Committee Meeting. Item 16 (Klondyke) Cllr J A Windell area had now been cleared. Thanked Cllr S J Tobin for help. Letter of thanks to go to Cllr Tobin's employer for free use of a digger for a day. Part of hard-surface prepared for resurfacing, but misunderstanding about cost. Town Council agreed previously to spend £1500. When contractor re-visited site, realised he quoted for a smaller area than had been prepared. Would be additional charge of £300. RESOLVED: an additional £300, making a total of £1800, be spent on the re-surfacing.

On item 18 (Grass Cutting Equipment) Clerk reported V J Rout had offered £1000 for the traded-in Snapper. Agreed acceptable. RESOLVED: subject to above Report be approved and its recommendations adopted. (ii) Report of the Meeting of

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Mon-Fri 9am-5pm, (Closed Wed), Sat 10am-4pm Unit 1, Southwold Business Centre, St Edmunds Road, Southwold IP18 6JU Traffic Management Committee held on 23rd June 2009 was approved and its recommendations adopted.

Southwold Harbour: (i) Welcomed Mr A Davies, Mr R Lee and Mr M Serjeantson, 3 appointees to prospective Southwold Harbour Lands Trust. E-mail read from Mr D Gallagher of WDC apologising for not being able to attend but confirming WDC's continued commitment to returning the harbour to local management and it was actively seeking ways of making a financial contribution possible through the provision of a loan or commitment of forward budgets or receipts in advance. Mr Davies, Lee and Serjeantson acknowledged work undertaken to date and emphasised it was a once-in-a-lifetime chance to get this right and not saddle further generations with an unworkable structure. Legal documents had to be drafted correctly and although an expensive exercise it would be a good investment. Hoped WDC and Town Council would sign a letter of intent agreeing to help. SHARP and Caravan Owners' Association had pledged £5000 each. Asking WDC and Town Council for £25,000 each. Envisaged as a maximum and would not all be sought at once. Cllr J L D Miller was concerned about WDC's commitment, but trustees were convinced of their intention. Cllr Mrs G A Bryant asked what would happen if WDC could not contribute. Mr Davies said £35,000 from Town Council, SHARP and COA would go a long way towards setting up the Trust prior to its receipt of rental income.

(ii) Considered request for a grant or loan of £25,000. The Deputy Mayor said any business needed working capital when starting up; Town Council had been working for several years to reach this point and had already invested money in the process. Had put large amounts into Stella Peskett Millennium Hall and William Godell Sports Pavilion, so should support Trustees by making a loan. The Deputy Mayor proposed: Town Council make an interest free loan of up to £25,000 to the Southwold Harbour Lands Trust, repayable after two years, but money be retained in Town Council's bank account, and drawn on by Trustees when needed. Cllr J L D Miller supported proposal saying if the people of Southwold wanted the harbour returned to local control they should be prepared to pay for it. Cllr Mrs M C Tucker - £25,000 was a large amount of money for a small Council like Southwold. Disappointed WDC could not apparently find an equivalent amount. Also concerned by imbalance in commitment. Would like to see Trust seeking funding from elsewhere. Proposition was then moved and CARRIED unanimously (Sec 144).

Appointment of Chair and Vice Chair of the Planning Group: Cllr Mrs Hunt to serve as Chair, Cllr Bailey to serve as Vice Chair. The Chairman thanked Cllr Stone for his services over many years on the Planning Group.

PUBLIC FORUM

D Cllr Tobin reported (a) the Community Emergency Group was going very well. There were now 6 radios in place. The next meeting will be held 17th June 09. The group will advertise for more members to join, and will invite Police to attend meeting. (b) Request for a Judicial Review re the Boundary Review, had been submitted to the Government by Waveney DC, Forest Heath DC and Suffolk Coastal DC. (c) Southwold public conveniences - D Cllrs Tobin and Mrs Allen had met with WDC Financial Director, who had said his department may be prepared to work with Southwold TC on this matter.

D Cllr Mrs Allen reported that the Blyth Estuary Group (BEG) had decided to form a 'Friends of BEG' group for the purposes of fund raising. Money from the Antiques Fair in August will be donated to the Group. It was now thought



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that money should come from the public and not just the local Councils involved.

PC Christopher Sadler reported that there had been just one crime since the previous meeting, which had been vandalism to a car St Felix School.

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for year ended 31/3/2009. Accounting books and records in good condition. Town Cllrs and Council Committees' financial checks were methodical, appropriate, demonstrating good combined effort to ensure integrity of finances. He completed Part 4 of Annual Return and answered all questions put by BDO Stoy Hayward in affirmative. Action taken by Town Council as a result of 2007/2008 report covered matters raised. Mr Baker made two points re. 2008/ 2009 accounts: i) Town Council agreed to reduce Fidelity Guarantee to £100,000, but insurance schedule recorded £200,000 (now received, Zurich apologised for not sending revised schedule sooner); ii) more cash now kept in office (from putting green and markets), amount covered was £100 in a locked receptacle and £500 in transit. *RESOLVED: Insurance cover for loss of money be raised to £3000.*

Kilcock Cliff Toilets: WDC agreed to re-open the toilets provided the Town Council undertook cleaning and restocking. Local contractor agreed to take on cleaning and toilets would be re-opened 1st July. *RESOLVED: Town Council to pay for cleaning and stocking them.*

Javelin European Championships: Southwold Sailing Club letter (19.6.09) about possibility of Town Council funding and organising a civic reception for the Javelin European Championship. Cost of buffet and wine for reception likely to be £150. Money in Chairman's Remuneration Fund. *RESOLVED: Up to £150 be spent on reception out of Chairman's Rem. Fund (Sec. 144).*

Policing in Southwold: Inspector S D Grimsey's letter (12.6.09) re. level of police cover at busy times. Financial constraints had impact on number of resources they could draw on on Bank Holidays. When he could Police would provide appropriate levels in Southwold during summer. Deputy Mayor - situation unlikely to improve as moving towards busiest time of year. New TRO soon to be in force

House work help required - Southwold

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but people parked on yellow lines anyway unless there was a police presence/enforcement. Sorry state of affairs when Police could not afford overtime on Bank Holidays. **Promenade**: Mrs C Fells's letter re. dogs on promenade and access for emergency vehicles. Contrary to letter it was possible to get a mobile telephone signal on the promenade with some networks. Deputy Mayor - lack of enforcement was the problem. Dog Control Byelaws said *dogs should be kept on leads on the promenade and banned from beach between Pier and Reading Room.* Were dogs running all over and she had never seen a WDC officer. Mrs Fells had been knocked over by a dog at a point where there was a sign painted on the promenade saying dogs should be on leads. *RESOLVED: WDC be asked again to undertake enforcement of the Dog Control Byelaw and asked to improve the signage.*

Gas Smell: Cllr S J Tobin reported two incidents in Sole Bay had given rise to the smell in town: 1) a ship to ship transfer of oil had been taking place, 2) a ship venting its tanks only 5 miles off-shore. The Emergency Planning Officer advised the shipping company such procedures should only be undertaken when ships were at least 20 miles off-shore, would be serious financial implications if it happened again. Cllr J A Windell noted fumes were nontoxic but asked if they were flammable.

Car Rally, Gun Hill: Request from Jowett Car Club for permission to park on Gun Hill on 23rd August. Town Council suggested South Green as an alternative.

Community Grants 2009/10– Round 2: WDC letter (19. 5.09) re. funding of North–East Suffolk Citizen's Advice Bureau. WDC's proposal to fund additional support for Advice Bureau by using balance of budget available for second round of Community Grants. No objection.

Blyth Valley Community Radio: Invitation (19.6.09) to attend radio's FM launch 4th July. Blyth Valley Radio hadasked for permission to put a banner on Electricity Green railings for two weeks. No objection.

Urgent Business

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Sea displays and lighthouse abseil highlights of Lifeboat Week

Sea Rescue displays off Southwold and Dunwich beaches will be the highlight of Lifeboat week. The display can be seen from the beach or the clifftops and will start at 10.45am on <u>Saturday August 8</u>. The Dunwich display is at three in the afternoon.

Tours of Southwold Lighthouse will take place on Tuesday August 4 from 10am to 5.00pm. Tickets will be available on the door: adults, £3 for adults, children, £2.

Other events on Flag Day, August 8, will be a sandcastle competition and balloon race, both on the beach below the Reading Room from 11am to 3pm. Entry to the sandcastle competition is £4 for teams of four up to 14 years old. There will be prizes for the 1st, 2nd and 3rd placed and icecreams will be provided by Susie's Kiosk for all competitors. Entry to the balloon race is £1 a balloon for a £20 prize for the one that travels the farthest.

Also on Saturday there will be Punch and Judy shows will be held at 12.30, 2.00 and 3.30 near the Pier. If wet, the shows will be held on the pier.

The final big event of the week is on Sunday 9th when volunteers will abseil down Southwold Lighthouse from 9am to 4pm. The 31-metre iconic building is still in full working order and stands in the middle of town. It is a oneoff opportunity as the Trinity House owned lighthouse, is not normally allowed to be used in this way.

So far 12 Southwold lifeboat crew are abseiling including Lifeboat Operations Manager John Huggins. It costs £25 per person and each needs to raise a minimum of £100 in sponsorship. Every person who takes part will receive an RNLI t-shirt and an abseil certificate. There is a 92-step circular staircase to the top of the lighthouse, so each participant needs to be in good health. Included in the selection of trade stands will be one specialising in Garden Railways with others selling



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

In support of ... LOCAL COUNCILS

It has long been a tenet of this column to present and encourage a citizen's right to engage positively with a relevant and lively local democracy to the point where such interaction may be viewed with excitement.

There are, however, caveats where Southwold and Reydon are concerned since few people would endorse the notion of *excitement* in relation to the current scene; even the word *engagement* is problematical since there does not appear to be an appetite for involvement with tens of people queuing for local office or more than a diehard following of our Councils' business. Perhaps the consequences of election are too onerous or people believe themselves incapable of sustaining interest for a long period of service?

Participating in local democracy has the potential to be an efficient and effective way of influencing what happens to an individual, one's neighbours and the community. But to make all this happen requires power, funding and responsibility being devolved, by all manifestations of government, to the lowest level.

If the public has the appetite for more decisions being taken locally then it may be able to influence such devolvement so that having a say in decisions that affect the lives of each one of us are made in a way to meet our needs, visions and expectations; having the local ballot box, alone, is no simple panacea.

So what encouragement should one derive from the current situation?

There are a host of examples of good governance, locally. One has only to look at the visual presentation of *Reydon Corner* over a twelve month period to appreciate a guiding hand and the success of the Town Council's restriction of parking overnight on the highway that is *North Parade* is testament to painstaking thought and action by elected representatives.

Of course, there are many other examples and, equally, it is easy for critics to suggest matters that have not been dealt with or ones that appear insurmountable to many. But let us acknowledge success and wish each of our representatives and their clerks, a relaxing summer's break. Ian R Bradbury, Hon. Secretary.

Boats for the Havergate Adventure will leave Orford Quay half hourly from 10am to 2.30pm each day. 

Symptomatic Swine Flu patients urged to use new Pandemic Service and get a flu friend

People in Great Yarmouth and Waveney who have Swine Flu symptoms are being advised to use a national flu service which launched THURSDAY 23 JULY.

Instead of contacting their GP, anyone with flu-like symptoms should call the National Pandemic Flu Service on **0800 1 513 100** or **0800 1 513 200 (textphone)** for advice.

People can also go online instead of calling the number via the website **www.direct.gov.uk/pandemicflu**.

The assessment of their symptoms will be carried out over the phone or via the internet and if necessary the advisor will authorise antiviral medication.

Dr Alistair Lipp, Director of Public Health for NHS Great Yarmouth and Waveney, said: "We are expecting the number of cases to rise and it will be very common to hear about people getting flu-like symptoms. It's generally a mild condition although we are aware of a small number of tragic deaths."

People are also being reminded to find a "flu friend" who would be able to collect the prescription for antiviral medication and then go to an Antiviral Collection Point (ACP). These may be located in specific pharmacies, or other clinics and their location will change depending on the number of people needing treatment.

At the moment, only a few pharmacies are stocking antiviral medication so people should not expect to be able to go to any pharmacy and get antiviral drugs. Patients will be informed which is their nearest ACP when they call the flu service.

A patient diagnosed with a flu-like illness through the new service will be given a "unique access number", which a flu friend can take to one of the ACPs for the antiviral medication. Flu friends need to take ID for themselves and for the patient in order to collect the drugs (e.g. utility bill, passport, credit/debit card, driving licence, NHS card).


<u>People should contact their doctor direct rather than</u> <u>using the National Pandemic Flu Service if:</u>

- they have a serious underlying illness;
- they are pregnant;
- they have a sick child under one year old;
- their condition suddenly gets much worse; or
- if their condition is still getting worse after 7 days (5 for a child).

It must be stressed that, for the vast majority of people, swine flu has been mild. Some people find they get better by staying in bed, drinking plenty of water and taking over the counter flu medication. *People with any of the following symptoms and a temperature of 38°C and above or feels hot may have swine flu. Typical symptoms are:* • <u>sudden fever</u> (a body *temperature of over 38C or 100.4F*), and • <u>sudden cough</u>. Other *symptoms may include: headache, tiredness, aching muscles, chills, limb or joint pain, diarrhoea or stomach upset, sore throat, runny nose, sneezing, loss of appetite.*

Anyone who has taken antiviral medication, but finds that their symptoms are getting worse should call their GP immediately, even if they do not have underlying health conditions. Anyone who has been in contact with a person who has Swine Flu symptoms should carry on as normal. There is no need for them to stay at home and not go to work. Antiviral drugs will not be given to anyone who has been or is in contact with a suspected case of the virus.

Take simple steps to help prevent catching colds and flu based on good respiratory and hand hygiene. Use a tissue to catch your sneezes, throw away used tissues where germs can linger and regularly wash your hands.

Summer Lecture season 2009

The lectures are at 7.30 pm in the Methodist Hall, East Green, Southwold. They are open to members and visitors alike, all are welcome; the tickets are £3.00 payable at the door.

Tuesday 4th August – The Life and work of Frank Jennings (1875-1961) – Bill Ungless and Piers Ford-Crush will talk about the Arts & Crafts architect, who lived and worked in Walberswick in the early years of the last century, and show excerpts from a DVD in High Definition which they developed from Bill's researches about his work and family. Bill will set Frank's work into the context of the Arts & Crafts Movement and after the viewing Piers can answer any questions, among other things, on how one can turn a lecture into a film: harder than you would think. Frank Jennings built at least a dozen houses in Walberswick including Far End for Philip Alexander, whose work can be seen in Southwold Museum, and he left a rich heritage since he was an avid collector of historic artefacts which he built into his houses. Copies of the DVD will be on sale for £5.00 per copy.

Tuesday 11th August – *A Photographic Collection of Bygones and Local Characters of Southwold* - the late Mr Arnold Barrett Jenkins, a vice president of the Southwold Archaeological & Natural History Society (now Museum & Historical Society), presented an annual lecture in the Town Hall Council Chamber as part of the Society's Summer series for many years. A Mystery Speaker (from the Society) will reprise this particular one using Barrett Jenkins' own slides and notes; it also formed the basis of his third book which was published in December 1985.



Mr Barrett Jenkins was a long serving Southwold town councillor, alderman and mayor as well as an avid local historian, much of his collection of notes, photographs (many taken by his father Frederick) and ephemera as well as his railway collection now form part of the museum collection.

Tuesday 18th August – Did The Eagle Land? – Huby



Suffolk Wildlife Trust Southwold Group

In mid June members of the Southwold Group of the Suffolk Wildlife Trust visited Earlsway Farm in Bramfield, near Halesworth. The farmer, Richard Symes, explained that his main crops are wheat, barley and peas, but he normally also grows hemp for commercial uses. However, due to the problems at the nearby processing plant, this year he is growing millet for birdseed instead.

Much conservation effort has been put in on his farm and there are currently 17 ponds, uncropped headlands and



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two woodlands, one of which is ancient in origin. There are also miles of permissive footpaths. Mr Symes took the group for a walk round to see some of the conservation initiatives, during which several interesting and very local species were seen. Most notable of these was a large wild service tree, which is very uncommon in Suffolk, and others were a plant of the blue flowered form of the scarlet pimpernel and a large skipper butterfly. This proved to be an interesting outing and was valuable in showing what a lot of farmers are doing to encourage our nature wildlife.

A few weeks later, in early July, a party visited the R.S.P.B.'s North Warren reserve, near Aldeburgh. Shown around by one of the local wardens, they spent most of the time in the wetter areas, and also walked on the former railway line to Leiston, and in the woodlands. Highlight of the morning was a bittern, which flew over, but they also saw a family of marsh harriers and several hobbys, small birds of prey which feed largely on dragonflies. These insects, and their related damselflies, were abundant and of several different species. This is also the best time of year for waterside plants, and they too were many and varied, with marsh birdsfoot trefoil and sweet smelling meadowsweet. **Peter Lawson**

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TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE Highlights of meeting held 23rd June 2009

PRESENT: Cllrs Mrs T E Baggott (in the Chair), P E Webb, Miss E A Betts, S J Tobin, Mr G Wallace (PCSO) and Mr I Irvine (PCSO).

Chairman: (i) *RESOLVED: Cllr Mrs G A Bryant appointed Chairman for the ensuing year.*

Traffic Review: Mr L Smith's report advised consultation period had passed and all objections removed by means of further consultation. Legal order was ready for sealing and should be made legal 15th July 2009. Lining work should start 1st July so it was in place for the week beginning 13th July. Mr G Wallace had asked for maintenance work to be undertaken to various roads at same time as white lining so there was only one period of disruption. The Committee reiterated Town Council's concerns re. proposal SCC had included late in consultation and at its own instigation for making part of St James' Green a one-way bus stand. Mr I Caruana (SCC) - at March meeting if there were objections to bus stand proposal it could be withdrawn. Committee had objected to proposal, as had others, and the bus stand element had been removed but the one-way element left in. Town Council had objected on safety grounds but had been told if it continued to object the whole order would be held up. Committee re-inforced Town Council's complaint re. way SCC had dealt with this matter. Committee including PCSOs agreed that making traffic turning right off North Parade use the southern arm of St James' Green would be more dangerous than the status quo.

Residential Parking & Permits for Tradesmen: Letter (26.5.09) from Mr R Trudgill suggesting residential parking permits be offered only to people who lived permanently in the town, not second-home owners, and parking permits be given to local tradesmen, defined as people who plied their trade most months of the year in town. Mr Trudgill had been invited again to put his views forward in person. Town Mayor had spoken to him and explained even if there was a residential scheme operating in the area where he lived it did not mean he would always be able to park near his home. Off-street parking free-of-charge by bottle banks etc. Mr G Wallace said authorities would look at need for general parking near school and toilet block.

SCC had a budget for looking into residential schemes if Town Council wanted to identify specific areas. Committee referred to Town Appraisal where Town Council had set out arguments for and against residential parking. Its conclusion had been the arguments against outweighed those for, and there had been no objection at the Annual Town Meeting when the Appraisal had been considered.

Committee agreed if that were the case, streets like Stradbroke Road, where there were more second homes than permanent residents, would probably be empty for much of the year.

On Mr Trudgill's idea - local tradesmen be given permits to park, Committee felt it would be difficult to determine who was entitled to a permit. *RESOLVED: (i) Town Council's policy not to seek residential parking be confirmed. (ii) Committee's views be conveyed to Mr Trudgill.*

Bollards, High Street: Mr I Irvine had been approached by Black Olive and the Art Shop about possibility of bollards outside their shops as lorries parking up on pavement had damaged an awning. Committee agreed this was a difficult problem: lorries parking with their wheels on a pavement did damage it as well as riskg damaging awnings, but if they did not do that they took up more of the carriageway which led to more congestion when cars were legally parked on the other side. Were bollards elsewhere - by The Crown and Buckenham House - but that they had been put there for specific reasons: to protect The Crown's sign and protect Buckenham House from lorries turning out of Church Street. If permission given for these businesses others would want bollards and result could be bollards the length of the High Street. Mr G Wallace said some of the awnings in town were too low – should be a minimum of 8 feet above the pavement – and that led to some of the problems. Committee considered also that bollards would further narrow the pavements. Reference was made to 'A' boards. Clerk reported SCC had approached businesses in East Street. RESOLVED: That the Black Olive and the Art Shop be advised of the Committee's views.

Gun Hill: Letter (14.6.09) from Mr & Mrs R Dales about cars parking on Gun Hill. On one occasion there had been 17 vehicles parked there of which only three or four were connected with the building work. Mr G Wallace - police and PCSOs did take action when they could either finding drivers and asking them to move or giving out tickets. People saw building contractors' vehicles and thought that parking was allowed, missing 'Access Only' sign, which many people misinterpreted anyway. Committee thought 'Access Only' sign should be reinforced by a sign saying 'No Parking Beyond This Point' and wooden posts, like those around The Common, should be put in to stop people parking on South Green and Constitution Hill also. RESOLVED: Waveney Norse be asked to consider protecting South Green, Gun Hill and Constitution Hill with wooden posts and to erect a sign at the entrance to Gun Hill saying 'No Parking Beyond This Point'.

(iii) Listed Building Consent – Insertion of fire door, **2 South Green**, for Adnams & Co Plc. *Approve*.

Cllr Mrs S Allen reminded Committee of suggestion that Waveney's new Chief Planning Officer, Mr P Ridley, be invited to a meeting. Matters such as lack of dimensions and confusing plans could be raised then. Clerk asked to invite Mr Ridley to October meeting of Committee.

Farmiloe Memorial Fund: Proposed by Cllr J R Winter, seconded by Cllr S J Tobin and, *RESOLVED: Cllr P E Webb be appointed as a trustee for next four years.*

Town Mayor's Local Welfare Fund: Proposed by Cllr J R Winter, seconded by Cllr J A Windell and, *RESOLVED: Cllr* J L D Miller be appointed as a trustee for next four years.

Income & Expenditure: Financial update for quarter ended 30th June 2009. Level of bank interest had on Bank of Ireland account had fallen from £15.07 in March to 0.03p in June whilst interest on a comparable amount in Lloyds account had been £1.53 in June. Clerk contacted Bank of Ireland but was still waiting to hear from Account Manger. Unless more satisfactory solution forthcoming, suggested transferring all funds in account into Lloyds Account. Vice Chairman investigating higher interest bearing accounts. *RESOLVED: Vice Chairman and Clerk be authorised to take appropriate action.*

(b) Quotes for repairing conservatory at 11 Station Road, obtained by Richard Jellicoe, from Duncan & Son, Cooper & Denny and Caplin. Cllr Mrs S Allen - might be cheaper to replace conservatory rather than repair it. *RESOLVED: Richard Jellicoe be asked to price a replacement conservatory before Town Council make a decision on tenders.*

Southwold Harbour Lands Trust: Mr A Davies' letter (1.7. 09), SHLT Chairman, thanking Town Council for offering Trust a loan of up to £25,000 but asking if it could be repaid within two years of end of their first full year of trading. Town Council's resolution had been an interest free loan of up to £25,000 be made, repayable after 2 years but money would remain in the Town Council's bank account and be drawn on by the Trustees when needed. 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
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
